## **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

Since the program's inception in February 2011, Automated Traffic Enforcement (ATE) has increased awareness and changed driver behavior.

• The numbers of drivers receiving speeding tickets has dropped since the first full year of ATE operations; from 4105 in 2012 to 1805 in 2022.

# **PURPOSE**

The purpose of the ATE program is to facilitate the safe flow of vehicle and pedestrian traffic resulting in safer roadways throughout Taber. Revenue is generated, but it is not the intent of the program as the funds the Town receives are allocated to enhancing crime prevention and education within the community of Taber, Alberta.

# **AUTOMATED TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT (ATE) - DATA**

ATE compliments but does not replace the need for traditional uniformed traffic enforcement.

Traffic safety education and traffic enforcement are priorities for the Taber Police Service. The Taber Police Service remains engaged in the Alberta Transportation Selected Traffic Enforcement Program, which is a targeted enforcement, and educational traffic safety initiative. Priorities and focus change from month to month. Taber Police Service officers continue to be diligent in investigating collisions, enforcing the Traffic Safety Act and other traffic related statutes.

# **ATE LOCATIONS**

Locations are selected within the criteria set out by the Province of Alberta which include:

- High-risk locations are those where the safety of citizens or police officers would be at risk through conventional enforcement methods.
- High-collision locations where data indicates a greater frequency of property damage, injury or fatal collisions.
- High-pedestrian volume locations where data indicates a high volume of pedestrian traffic.
- All school and playground zones.
- Public Concerns

#### THE CITY OF LETHBRIDGE IS THE ATE CONTRACTOR FOR THE TOWN OF TABER.

The City of Lethbridge performs photo enforcement for the Town of Taber. In 2022 the total amount of operator deployment of photo speed enforcement was **574 hours**.

Mobile Photo Enforcement Operators are Peace Officers while on-duty.

- The Province of Alberta (Justice and Solicitor General) authorizes the training and appointment of the Operators.
- ATE vehicles are permitted to park on boulevards, shoulders and no parking areas under the authority of the Traffic Safety Act. The Town's preference would be for them not to utilize these areas for parking, but for some locations, this is the safest approach.

# **RESULTS**

There have been no fatal collisions on Highway 3 in the Town of Taber since the implementation of Automated Traffic Enforcement in 2011. The total number of Automatic Traffic Enforcement tickets has decreased since the inception of ATE technology has been introduced even though the total days of use has increased from 5 days per month to 6 days per month.

# **HOW IS ATE FINE REVENUE DISTRIBUTED?**

ATE violations are issued as Provincial Violation Tickets. The Province of Alberta controls what the applicable fines are for each offense as well as the fine distribution formulas for all collected revenue.

## **2022 ATE Fine Collection and Distribution**

• Total Collected \$ 260029.00 -100%

• Provincial Portion \$ 143015.00 - 55%

Contractor Portion \$ 37905.00 - \$21 dollars per notice

• Town of Taber Portion \$ 81044.00

Each year, a detailed budget is prepared by the Taber Municipal Police Commission in conjunction with the Taber Police Service and presented to the Taber Town Council along with the annual Taber Police Service plan. The Town of Taber Council approves the yearly budget and allocates funds each year for the operation of The Taber Police Service. The Taber Town Council has directed that the total amount of revenue be applied to offset the costs of policing in the Town of Taber. Keeping in mind that approximately 20 percent of each patrol constable's time is spent on traffic enforcement, the ATE investment is only a small portion of the total 4.9 million dollar Taber Police Service budget.
